Every year since 2001, Spokane Public Library, Spokane County Library District and Auntie's Bookstore have chosen a book for Spokane Is Reading to inspire conversations and encourage reading. In an effort to find her, daughter Bee begins collecting emails, notes, and other documents written by her mother and others for clues to her mother's motives and whereabouts. The result is a funny, touching, outlandish adventure that stretches the usual expectations for a novel.



CUSTOMIZE YOUR LIBRARY EXPERIENCE

Log In to Your Account

Library Card Number (Barcode):

LAST NAME (Enter in all UPPERCASE):

Reading history—Keep a list of what you've borrowed; default setting is to never record this but you can change privacy settings to opt in to keep track from that point forward; you can also clear it whenever you want and it's never viewable by library staff.

Purchase suggestions—Recommend titles to the library; if we purchase it we will hold it for you and send out a notice when it's ready to pick up; if we don't, we'll contact you about other options to get it.

Messaging—Select when and how you receive advance due, hold available, and overdue notices; opt in to check out/in notices for a record of everything you borrow and return sent to your email.

Lists—Compile a list of library titles on a subject you're interested in or of books you plan to read; change its setting from private to public to share with other library members.

It's been a whole year since we joined the Co-operative Information Network and switched to a new computer system, and we're still finding new benefits every day. Recently, we discovered the extensive customizable features of the computer catalog when you log into your account.

Like with most library systems, by logging into your account with your library card number and password you receive a summary of items you have out and when they're due, the option to renew eligible items, any outstanding fees you might owe for late materials, and any requests for books or DVDs that are on their way or have arrived for you to pick up. But there's so much more!

Personal details—Update your address, email, or phone here; library staff will double check for accuracy on your next visit.

Tags—Attach your own subject/topic terms to items in the catalog to help others identify titles of interest to them; some currently used tag examples are "police detective," "mythology," "cooking light," and "foul language."

Search history—Track every search you've made when logged into the system; click to run again or delete entire history at any time.



Back to School Safety Tips from Chief Asmus,



The summer is almost over and a new school year is ready to begin. For some children it is a time to return to their classroom, renew old friendships and to meet new friends. For other students it means going to a different school, excited and eager to face a new time in their life, perhaps with some reservation.

As the children are heading back to school, during the early mornings and early afternoons, the roads become crowded with pedestrians, bikes and cars in a rush to and from work and school.

It is important to help the children to and from school safely, here are some tips for our residents:

Walking:

Work out a safe route to your school with your children.



Walk with a friend, never alone.

Do not accept rides or gifts from strangers.

If you see anyone doing anything that makes

you uneasy, tell your parents or a teacher.

Always cross at the corner. Parents should set an example for their children.

Driving:

When you are traveling in your car be sure to observe the speed limits in school zones.



Drop off your children in a safe place, avoiding areas that congest traffic.

Do not stop in traffic to drop off your children.

Never call your child to your car from the opposite side of the street. Always cross at the corner.

If you have special needs, contact someone at the school and alert the police department to assist you.


Bicycle:

Connect with Your Library: A Mobile App for Washington

The Washington State Library is partnering with the Paul G Allen Family Foundation on a mobile application ("app") that will connect citizens to their library and its services with one click. Seattle Public Library and King County Library District already have mobile apps that look like the image on the right. The State Library is now helping smaller libraries like Liberty Lake acquire the same helpful technology.



The Library App will enable users to search the catalog, place holds and renewals, review their accounts, connect with downloadable vendors and see book reviews. A built-in barcode scanner will let patrons scan an item's ISBN code and immediately know if the library owns the item.

When the Library App is released later this year patrons will literally be able to perform from their smartphones and tablets most library functions that are available through the library's in-house computers.

NEW BOOKS

The Cuckoo's Calling J.K. Rowling, writing under the name Robert Galbraith, tries adult fiction again—this time to great acclaim—in the first of this planned private eye series.



The Curiosity A man found frozen in the Arctic is brought back to life through a controversial procedure. As he grows close to the doctor who reanimated him, he must face new challenges from the sides of both science and religion.

Transatlantic National Book Award winner Colum McCann weaves a multigenerational tale that touches major international events, from American slavery to World War I to the peace process in Northern Ireland.

Revolutionary Summer: the Birth of American Independence Pulitzer Prize winner Joseph Ellis examines the crucible in which the independence movement—and strategy—formed over the historic summer of 1776.

Scatter, Adapt, and Remember: How Humans Will Survive a Mass Extinction By looking back at past catastrophic events and current preparations for new threats, science writer Annalee Newitz actually takes an encouraging position on our chances for survival when the next disaster inevitably hits.

The Spark: a Mother's Story of Nurturing Genius A remarkable story of a mother's belief in her son and the measures she took to nurture his passions and challenge the fatalism of an autism diagnosis. It paid off—at age 12 he became a paid quantum physics researcher.

Identity Thief Breakout star Melissa McCarthy (*Bridesmaids*) in another wild performance, this time as an unrepentant scam artist who faces her scammees (Jason Bateman).
