

New Website for the City of Liberty Lake and the Library


On January 13th, visitors to libertylakewa.gov will be in for something new. The City website, which includes the Library page, has been redesigned to make it easier and quicker to find important information like news, events, permits, forms, and emergency notifications and to connect with City officials and staff.

On the new site you can set up a personal account to have the City news that's important to you delivered to your email by subscribing to calendar feeds, departmental notifications, bids, and more. And with the "Report a Concern" feature you'll be able to report problems like potholes and downed

tree branches, and ask questions about doing City business directly to the appropriate staff for efficient and accountable follow-up.

On the Library page you'll notice we've rearranged a few things but we hope that makes them easier to find. And the new design has allowed us to stick important tools and information—like the catalog and calendar—throughout the site so that you're never more than a click away from what you need to do.

Stop by libertylakewa.gov on January 13th and have a look at the new site. Let us know what you think. We think you'll like what you see.





Rules:

2. Entries must be your own creation, not a Lego designed kit, project found online or in a magazine, etc.
3. One entry per participant or team.
4. Your creation must fit within a space of 15 by 15 inches and may be no taller than four feet.
5. There will be 4 age categories 4-6, 7-10, 11-17, 18 and up
6. Completed projects must be delivered to the Library January 13—18 during library hours.

When you bring in your project, you will fill out a card to place in front of your project.

7. Judging will be by popular vote from January 21— Noon, January 25th.

Havisham Ronald Frame imagines how the iconic recluse of Dickens's *Great Expectations* got that way.

Identical Scott Turow returns with a novel that retells the Greek myth of Castor and Pollux in modern day Chicago politics.

Where the Moon Isn't Schizophrenic Matthew still hears the voice of his brother, Simon, dead these 10 years. An affecting story of a family broken by grief rebuilding with love.

Hyperbole and a Half: Unfortunate Situations, Flawed Coping Mechanisms, Mayhem, and Other Things That Happened Blogger and illustrator Allie Brosh treats depression, creativity, and young adulthood with dark humor in this collection of autobiographical webcomics.

The Men Who United the States: America's Explorers, Inventors, Eccentrics and Mavericks, and the Creation of One Nation, Indivisible British historian Simon Winchester profiles the men who shaped the vision of our country, encompassing its many places and peoples with a title nearly as expansive.

What's So Funny? My Hilarious Life Comic actor Tim Conway (McHale's Navy, The Carol Burnett Show, Dorf) didn't always have a hilarious life but his rags-to-riches memoir is still full of laughs.
