Goals, Objectives, & Actions

Introduction

The goals, objectives, and actions form a practical roadmap for how Liberty Lake will care for and enhance its parks, trails, recreational programs, open spaces, and public art offerings. They reflect community priorities and help guide city decisions, from setting priorities for new investments to taking care of what already exists. By laying out both big-picture directions and concrete next steps, this framework helps ensure that Liberty Lake’s parks and recreation system continues to reflect community values and supports a vibrant, connected, and accessible future.

Action	TC3.1.1	Coordinate with other agencies/jurisdictions and trails committee(s) to ensure a comprehensive approach to trail system planning.



Equity and Accessibility

Type	#	Goal/Objective
Goal	EA1	Parks and recreational programs are accessible to all.
Goal	EA2	Parks and recreational programs meet a wide range of public needs and wants.
Objective	EA1.1	Parks should be within a ten-minute walk of all residents.
Objective	EA1.2	Parks' facilities should be accessible to the widest range of citizens.
Objective	EA2.1	Provide recreation programs from passive use to organized.
Objective	EA2.2	Include the community in the development and improvement of parks and recreational programs.

Action	EA1.2.1	New parks or major park improvements will be reviewed for accessibility and involve community input in development.
Action	EA2.2.1	Recreational programming will be reviewed by the Parks and Art Commission, and end-of-program surveys will be offered to the participants to involve the community in future program development.

Introduction

Liberty Lake’s Parks and Recreation Master Plan is closely tied to the broader vision established in the City’s Comprehensive Plan. The goals and policies in those elements – such as land use, transportation, natural environment, capital facilities, and cultural resources – provide essential direction that shapes how the parks system grows, operates, and serves the community. The following summaries highlight where these Comprehensive Plan policies align with and support the Parks Plan, demonstrating how the City’s long-range planning efforts work together to create a connected and accessible parks and recreation system.

Comprehensive Plan Integration

The **Land Use element** includes policies that encourage development, preserve open space, address neighborhood concerns, and support quality of life.

The **Urban Design element** promotes well-designed public and private spaces, including streetscapes, gateways, and neighborhood centers. It encourages pedestrian, bicycle, and alternative transportation access, as well as the integration of public art and cultural resources.

The **Transportation element** supports safe, convenient connections for walking, biking, and other non-motorized travel between housing, recreation, schools, and commercial areas. It also promotes the development and maintenance of trails and alternative transportation corridors.

The **Natural Environment element** includes policies to protect sensitive areas, wetlands, and trees. It encourages native landscaping, water conservation, and public awareness of environmental stewardship.

The **Capital Facilities element** demonstrates how parks, trails, and recreation facilities will be maintained and enhanced. It emphasizes coordination with land use, transportation, and utilities planning and opportunities for shared or multi-use facilities.

The **Cultural Resources element** includes policies to preserve and promote cultural resources and public art. It supports programs that enhance Liberty Lake’s identity and community spirit.
